

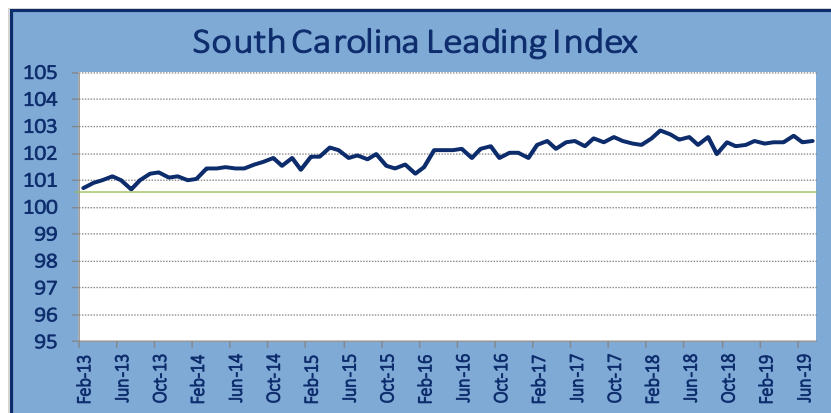

ECONOMIC OUTLOOK

The South Carolina Leading Index (SCLI) rose 0.04 points last month, ending with a value (following revisions) of 102.46.

SCLI metrics were mixed in July. Unemployment claims were up 5.6 percent. The number of issued housing permits increased 11.4 percent month-over-month and valuation for the permits rose 11.2 percent. The average weekly manufacturing hours fell 0.9 percent, and the Dow Jones Composite Average was up 1.1 percent.

The Conference Board's national Leading Economic Index rose 0.5 points in July to 112.2. The bump was driven by strong stock prices and an uptick in housing permits. Index readings over 100 forecast expansion of the economy, but growth is likely to be slow for the remainder of the year.

Non-Seasonally Adjusted Wage and Salary Employment

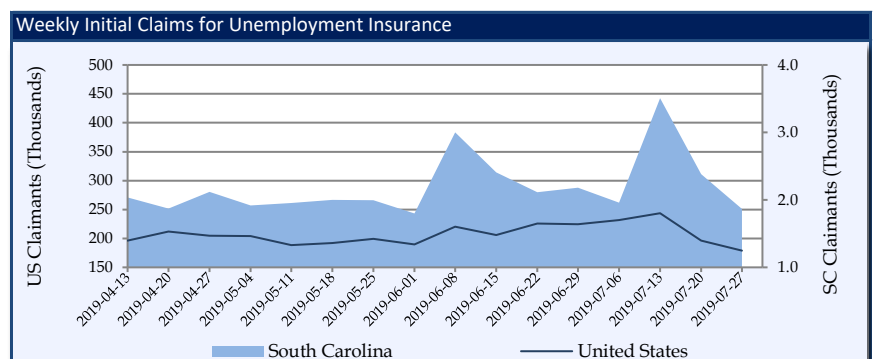
South Carolina's total non-seasonally adjusted nonfarm employment fell by 12,500 net jobs to 2,181,700 in July, a 0.6 percent decrease from revised June numbers but 2.4 percent higher than one year ago. Job gains were nonetheless reported in several sectors, with Manufacturing (+2,400) leading the way. Net gains in other sectors included Trade, Transportation, and Utilities (+2,000); Finance (+1,300); Educational and Health Services (+900); and Leisure and Hospitality (+300). Net losses occurred in the Government (-12,800); Professional and Business Services (-4,200); and Construction (-2,100) sectors. The Information and Natural Resources and Mining sectors were unchanged from the prior month. Compared to one year ago, the state economy added 51,200 nonfarm jobs.

Weekly Unemployment Claims

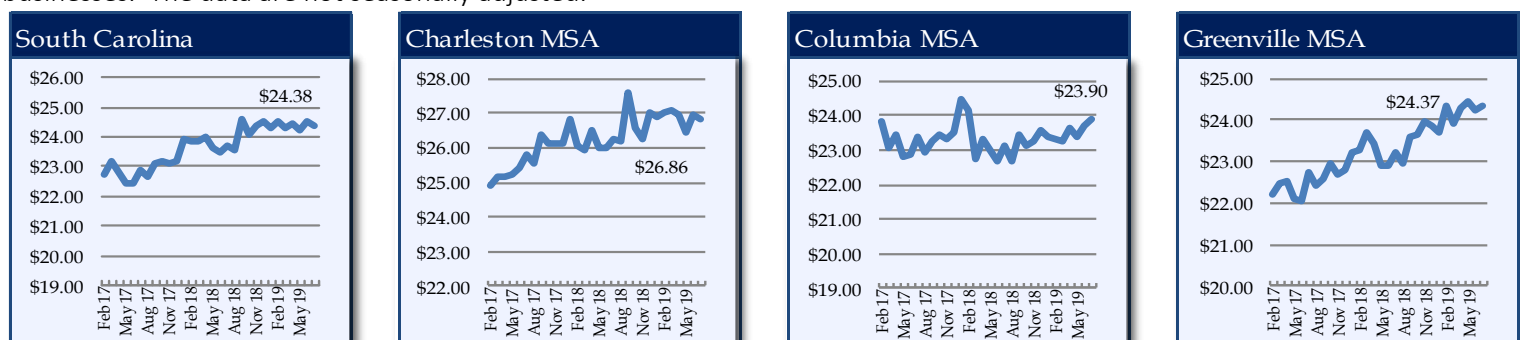
The average number of initial reported claims for unemployment insurance in the state increased in July. The average for the month was 2,429 weekly initial claims, up 5.6 percent month-over-month but down 17.4 percent compared to one year ago.

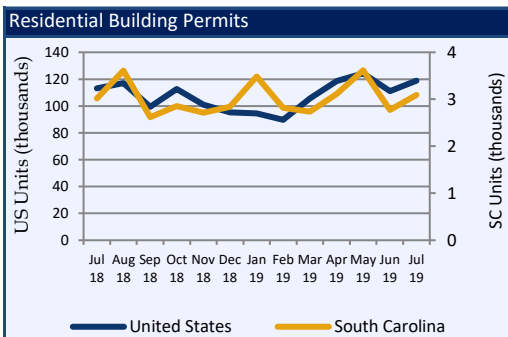
Real Estate & Business Activity

In July, the number of building permits issued in South Carolina for new residential construction rose 11.4 percent to 3,091. This figure was 2.3 percent higher than one year ago. Valuation for the permits rose 11.2 percent month-over-month and was 4.4 percent higher than one year ago. Total closings were flat compared to June, as was the median sales price. Foreclosure activity dropped 4.9 percent from July 2018. Among the top six MSAs, total closings were up in all but Charleston and Greenville. Median sales price was mixed, with Florence (+7.3 percent) reporting the largest bump and Charleston (-3.2 percent) reporting the steepest decline.

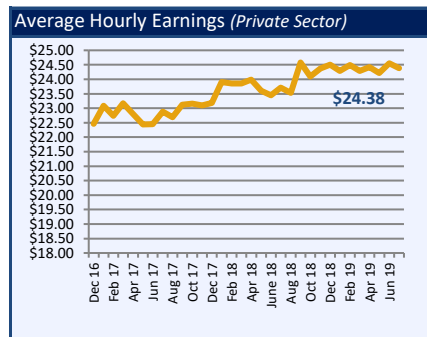

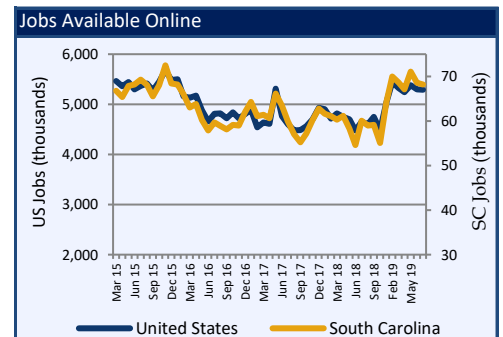

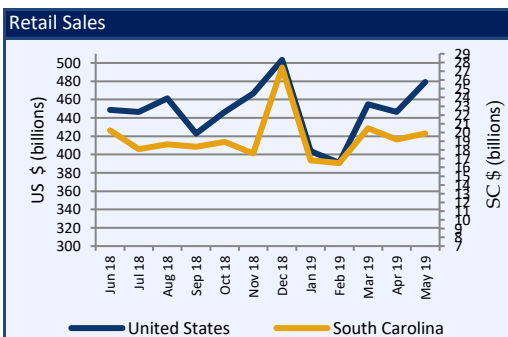

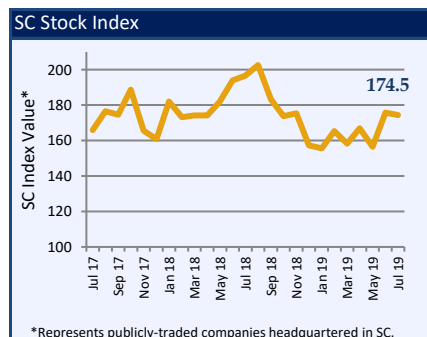

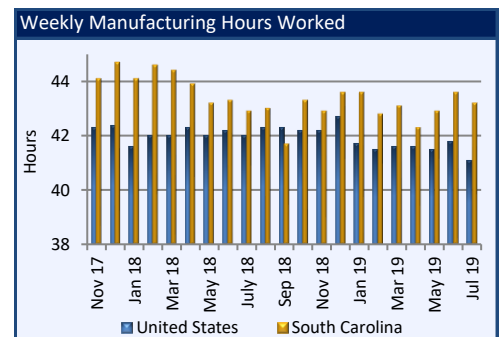

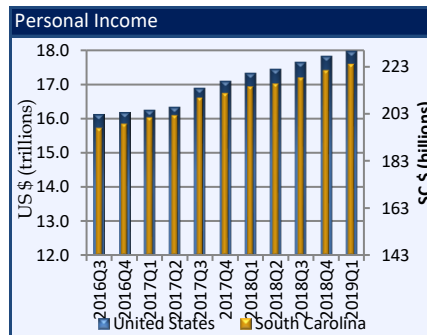

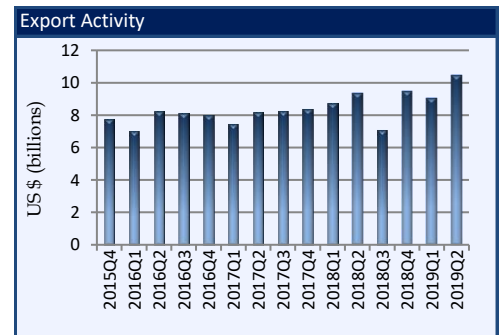
Income and Output

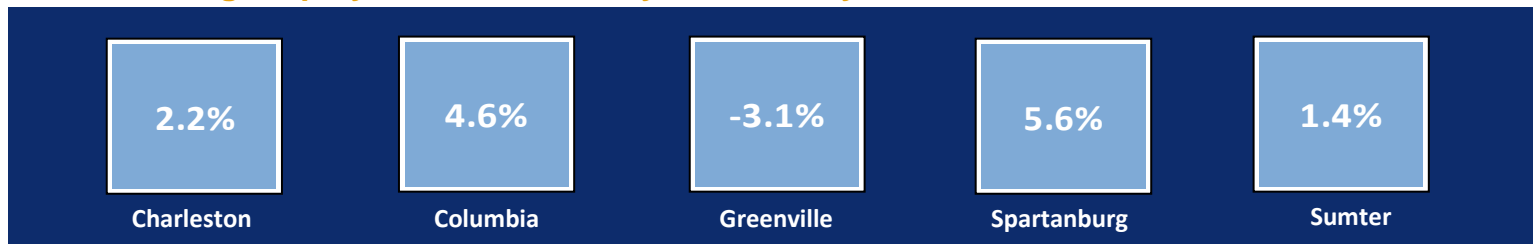
